As a training center affiliated with AMI, The Montessori Training Center of St. Louis trains teachers in AMI diploma courses that are recognized internationally for their quality and authenticity. MLS teachers have all received this intensive training in the Montessori pedagogy practiced in more than 110 countries worldwide, and thus the education provided by MLS is consistent with AMI Montessori schools around the world.

The location of MLS at Grand Center situates the institution at a central location for experiencing the growing multicultural St. Louis community. Located in the middle of a multicultural neighborhood, down the street from the Cortex Innovation Complex and adjacent to the arts district, MLS is at the center of ample resources and diverse cultures. Given its advantageous location, MLS is in a key position to help

foster a welcoming and diverse community devoted to effecting positive change, thus contributing to the global Montessori movement.

MLS has already crafted a list of action items to fulfill as a new ambassador school. Such actions include: joining the UNESCO Associate School Network; recruiting 2-3 ambassadors from the MLS community; recruiting a native speaking French or Spanish speaker for an assistant teaching position, translating a portion of the school website into Spanish; hanging a Mosaic banner prominently in or outside the school; recruiting "buddy families" for foreign newcomers to serve as a point of contact and to assist in getting oriented to the new city; and communicating to the school community about the participation in multicultural community activities in St. Louis.
